HOCKEY VICTORIA CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

Every person in Victoria has the right to participate in community sport which is safe, welcoming and inclusive. Equally everyone plays a part in ensuring their actions and behaviours are supportive of these values.

Australians and particularly Victorian's, love their sport, however, this can at times create unpleasant situations. Over-zealous parents, boisterous spectators, opinionated players and quick-tempered coaches may need to be reminded of appropriate behaviour when involved with sport.

The Australian Sports Commission (ASC) has developed the *Junior Sport Codes of Behaviour* to remind and encourage all Australians involved in sport, whether they are a player, parent, coach, administrator, official, or spectator to support and nurture all our young players. Hockey Victoria (HV) strongly endorses the ASC's *Junior Sport Codes of Behaviour* and has adapted these Codes to be applicable to all levels of Hockey in Victoria, not just junior Hockey, and we would encourage all affiliated clubs and associations to also endorse and adopt these Codes of Behaviour within their club environment. You can modify the Codes template as required to suit your own needs and circumstances. HV's Codes of Behaviour should also be read in conjunction with Hockey Australia's (HA) *Codes of Behaviour* and the Victorian Government's *Victorian Code of Conduct for Community Sport* which outlines behaviours which are expected to be followed by every person involved in community sport, as well as identifying the Behaviours which must not be tolerated.

An excellent resource available to assist all participants in sport is the **Play by the Rules** website(www.playbytherules.net.au).

Bad sporting behaviour is unacceptable, and it can be unlawful. The Play by the Rules website provides information and online training on equal opportunity and other relevant legislation to address inappropriate behaviour in sport.

As a player, parent, coach, administrator, official or spectator in any activity held by or under the auspices of HV or one of HV's Affiliated Clubs or Associations, you must meet the requirements in regard to your conduct during any such activity or event.

Pitch perfect – Hockey in Geelong scores \$625,000

Sunday, 24 February 2013

More people in Geelong will be getting more active, more often, following today's announcement of \$625,000 in funding to install a second synthetic hockey pitch at Stead Park, reinforcing the venue as a regional hockey centre in Geelong.

Minister for Sport and Recreation Hugh Delahunty, joined by Andrew Katos, Member for South Barwon, today visited the centre to announce the funding from the Victorian Government's *Community Facility Funding Program- Major Facilities category*.

"One of the Victorian Government's key objectives is to build healthy and active communities," Mr Delahunty said.

"To achieve this goal, we need quality community facilities that encourage local people to play the sports they love for many years to come.

"Hockey Geelong is one of Hockey Victoria's strongest affiliates catering for players ranging from 5 to over 60 years of age.

"The extra pitch will allow associations such as Hockey Geelong and its affiliate clubs to develop local talent and competitions, and provide a wider range of opportunities for the more than 1000 members keen to play.

"I'm confident we'll soon see some state and national championships secured for Geelong's passionate hockey community thanks to this project," Mr Delahunty said.

Mr Delahunty said the funding for the project would go towards establishing the extra pitch as well as fencing, drainage and floodlighting, which would enable clubs to train and play well into the night.

"Our investment in this project is part of our plan to build more sustainable venues that make a difference to people," Mr Delahunty said.

"Sporting facilities are important community assets and provide a social hub, particularly in regional areas.

"As well as the health benefits, we are also helping to stimulate the local economy and create jobs throughout the construction phase."

Mr Delahunty said the Government was focussed on building better sporting facilities for local people across the State, while also delivering important outcomes for the Victorian community.

"This is just one way we are delivering on the Victorian Government's strategy to grow the economy, build infrastructure and contribute to the health and wellbeing of the State," Mr Delahunty said.

Mr Delahunty thanked funding partners City of Greater Geelong, for its contribution of more than \$1 million to the project, and Geelong Hockey Association for providing \$250,000.

Umpire Convenor's & Umpire Development Report

This season we've had a major boost in umpiring numbers which has been very pleasing. Many senior players have picked up their whistles again, while a large number of new recruits – both junior and senior – have been accredited under the national Hockey Ed programme. Throughout all the clubs within Geelong Association, we have numerous Community accredited umpires and a growing number of Level 1 umpires. Next year we hope to increase our numbers of Level 2 accreditations, which will provide aspiring Geelong umpires the opportunity of being nominated for national tournaments.

Thanks to clubs for backing and promoting the Hockey Ed Umpire programme and for helping develop those willing to put themselves up to the rigors of umpiring.

I'd like to thank Scott O'Reilly for running our umpire development courses, and also David Fitzgerald, who as Hockey Geelong's Umpire Convenor, did a fantastic job rostering umpires for local Senior matches throughout the season. This is no mean feat, as David spent several hours every week on the roster - made all the more difficult as he had to work around the umpires' own local and representative playing commitments.

The transition of records from Hockey Victoria to a centralized nationwide record-keeping database at Hockey Australia has had several setbacks, with many of our umpires reporting their records seem to have disappeared. This has resulted in a difference of opinion regarding several umpires' accreditation level.

It is imperative that umpires keep their accreditation up-to-date, as things have changed a lot since the new programme was introduced 2 seasons ago. Umpires that do not get a practical reassessment before their accreditation expires may have to re-sit the programme from scratch. The Hockey Victoria Officials programme allows for umpires to be rostered on for HV junior and senior matches. Every club has to meet a pro rata quota of umpires that are "Officials", depending on the number of teams competing in the HV competition. The rationale behind this is to encourage all clubs to develop their umpire programmes — with the end result being to provide an umpire for all their matches. We currently have 7 umpires who are Officials. Any level of umpire can become an Official; and, though encouraged, it is not necessary to umpire the HV competition.

Whilst on the HV competition, thank you to all the umpires who committed to umpiring every week for the Hockey Geelong Junior Rep teams. We understand it is a big commitment to give up your Friday nights for the entire season and we greatly appreciate your efforts.

Many umpires sought development through umpiring at the U13 Carnival and Women's Country Championship tournaments. The recent Australian Masters Games held in Geelong also provided our more accomplished umpires further opportunities.

Hockey Victoria offered a development pathway at the Junior Country Championships and upon selection, some umpires secured additional development at the Junior State Championships. Our participating umpires were Sean Fitzgerald, Luke Hatton and Niko Hinett at the Junior Country Championships, and Will Crosbie, Leo Fitzgerald and Luke Hatton (all Level 1 accredited umpires), at the Junior State Championships. Will Crosbie also participated in the Talented Umpire Development Program ran by Hockey Victoria earlier this year.

We also had umpires selected to umpire at national tournaments over the previous year – Leo Fitzgerald at the Australian Women's Masters Championships and Courtney Pearson at the U15 Girls National Championships.

For the 2014 season we welcome Courtney Pearson, who will be taking on a facilitator role for umpire development sessions. We also hope to have several umpires complete their Umpire Coach accreditation.

The Hockey Geelong Most Improved Umpire trophy was awarded to Christian O'Halloran, from the Newtown club.

On behalf of David Fitzgerald and myself, we congratulate all of our umpires for a productive year and we thank them for their commitment and dedication to developing their umpiring. An additional thank you to those umpires who have extended themselves through umpiring at tournaments to receive the benefit of umpire coaching from experienced umpire coaches; it is much appreciated. We look forward to them sharing their knowledge and skills to our future developing umpires.

The umpire coordinator (senior competition) David Fitzgerald reports that most clubs are attempting to provide umpires available to be rostered.

The aim is for all clubs to supply at least 2 umpires per registered team . Newer clubs such as Golden Plains and Torquay can be excused somewhat for failing to reach this

desired outcome. Some established clubs are struggling in this area. This means that a few umpires are doing a bulk of umpiring for their clubs.

Clubs need to be continually training up new umpires via winter juniors or summer comps. The pool of senior umpires needs to be enlarged to cater for natural attrition.

Many thanks to all umpires this year. Most of you also play locally and/or for HG rep teams and Premier League clubs.

The rostering has been made easier by the availability of non-playing umpires.

Many thanks to: Peter Kolsch, Guy Hackwell, Craig Molyneux, Brett Bingham, Steve Heselwood and Peter Dolenc.

It is hoped that we can expand this group because of the experience they provide and also reducing the load put on other umpires who are either playing and/or coaching.

Development Officer Report

This year I visited 5 schools in the Geelong region spending between 3 – 6 weeks at each school. These schools included Mandama (Grovedale), Surfside (Ocean Grove), Leopold, Holy Family (Bell Park) and St Therese (Torquay). Depending on the size of the school I would generally run 1 hour clinics with 25 – 50 students attending each session. Ages of these students ranged from Preps to Grade 6's. I would run clinics based on safety of hockey, drills and games. After the clinics I would promote our Superclinics and Hockey clubs based in their area. This year Andy Hair (from Leopold Primary School) and I decided to put together a school

This year Andy Hair (from Leopold Primary School) and I decided to put together a school Hockey competition inviting the following schools to Stead Park for the day.

Leopold Primary School
Mandama Primary School (Grovedale)
Bellaire Primary School (Highton)
Torquay Primary School

Each school entered a 7 a side girls and boys team. We divided the pitch into 2 fields and ran a round robin competition with the school with the highest number of wins moving through to the next round in Melbourne. This was a successful day with Leopold Boys and Mandama Girls teams progressing through. Both teams went on to Werribee but came 2nd overall. We held 2 Superclinics this year. The first one was Tuesday 9th April and the second was Tuesday 24 September.

Tuesday 9th April we had 45 participants register; 14 new participants signed up for winter hockey to relevant hockey clubs.

Tuesday 24 September we had 58 participants register, with 7 new participants signing up to play summer hockey.

The majority of these junior participants had already played hockey and were after some extra coaching. The Superclinics were run by volunteers and Junior Representative players. The Representative players would conduct the drills and run the games. The participants enjoyed learning from these players.

I believe that we need to continue the link between running school clinics – to come and have go at hockey via Superclinics then feed these participants into club hockey is a great way keep Hockey Geelong participants numbers grow strong.

A major key to Hockey Geelong's future playing success is to ensure talented junior players are identified and developed, and it is vital these players get excellent coaching and access to specialist player development programs throughout their junior career.

Hockey Geelong is proud to announce the Hockey Geelong Academy was launched this year, following a proposal put forward by Senior Men's coaches Andrew Smith and Grant Downie.

Such a program will not only enhance players' individual potential, but will also create a seamless transition into the association's Senior Representative ranks.

Headed by former Australian Kookaburra and 2008 Olympian Andrew Smith, the academy aims to provide the participants with specialized coaching that will give them a technical advantage and additional skills.

About 50 of the region's top juniors were selected for the Academy this year and the programme will operate through the off-season and into the 2014 season as well, giving participants opportunity to put into practice what they have been taught.

While concentrating on honing the players' basic skills, the programme will also enhance their tactical skills and increase their fitness. The Academy will also use guest coaches – both current and former Australian players – to add an extra depth to the programme. Hockey Geelong President Alan Climpson is excited about the Academy.

"Hockey Geelong is going ahead from strength to strength, and it is hoped that through the association's academy coaching programme, our young players will have an advantage when it comes to state trials," he says.

"We have a large group of very capable players – some of whom are already showing they have what it takes to play in the State's top junior sides," Climpson says. "The academy is the link that will get these young players into these top teams and get Geelong back up to the top."

Fun, learning skills and improvement

With such a high level of new players Torquay Hockey Club's emphasis is to provide players with a good experience, to have fun and learn new skills. With so many players there were some difficult days playing against more experienced teams. The skill levels of the players however improved dramatically with some teams becoming very competitive by the end of the season. The new Torquay U11 team was an example of this where they finished second in the competition with the majority of players being in their first season.

Junior coaching

Junior pathways

Junior parents

A unique aspect of the Torquay Hockey Club is that the majority of parents are not from the hockey community. We have turned this into our strength, as we now have many committed parents that love watching the game and encouraging players regardless of their ability.

Senior Men

In 2013 Torquay entered - for the first time - teams in Division 1 and Division 2 men's competition. This was a historic event. The players came from either the local community, friends of players within the club or the former South Barwon Hockey Club players. We are pleased to provide local players from within Torquay community the opportunity to re-engage with hockey. Many of these players have played hockey previously and returned to the game as there is now a local team. The teams were also blended with junior players.

Both the Division 1 and 2 men's teams made the finals. The Division 2 team finished 3rd on the ladder and the Division 1 team lost the Grand Final in extra time. The club was very proud to be so competitive in our first season and with the style of hockey played. The Division 1 Grand Final was an example of this with a great game against Newtown Hockey Club.

Senior Women

The Division 2 women's team was a great success with the girls winning the Grand Final in our first year. The team had a wonderful blend of senior and junior players. HOCKEY VICTORIA COMPETITION Victorian League Best and Fairest

This season the Hockey Victoria competition structure was completely overhauled, with State League and Pennant grades renamed and reformatted.

The top Men's and Women's competitions (formerly State League 1 and Pennant A) are now called Premier League (PL) and Premier League Reserves (PLR), while State League 2 and Pennant B are now known as Vic League 1 (VL1) and Vic League 1 Reserves (VL1R); State League 3 and Pennant C renamed as Vic League 2 (VL2) and Vic League 2 Reserves (VL2R).

The Victorian Men's competition has a further Vic League 3 and VL3 Reserves; then 3 Pennant divisions, and 12 Metro divisions. The Women's competition has two Vic League divisions (plus the Reserves); as well as 3 Pennant grades and 6 Metro grades.

This restructure saw some grades increase the number of teams, and resulted in both Hockey Geelong Men's and Women's 1st and 2nd Representative teams being put up to the VL2 and VL2R divisions. The Men's third team was entered into the Metro West competition.

Murray Medal and Kirk Medal

In 2001 two Perpetual trophies were created by Hockey Geelong's management committee to be presented to the players voted Best & Fairest from the women's (Murray Medal) and men's (Kirk Medal) top State League (now Vic League) teams.

These prestigious perpetual trophies were named the Murray Medal and the Kirk Medal, after two Hockey Geelong life members, Margaret Murray and Jim Kirk, who have both made immense contributions to hockey in Geelong and the wider hockey community.

It was good to see extra team numbers in the Under 13, Under 15 and Under 17 competitions. The increase in Under 17 teams is particularly pleasing as this provides an opportunity for more players to try the sport; many of whom may not yet be ready for senior competition. Other strong performances in preseason practice matches put the group in a very positive frame of mind coming into the start of the regular season.

The group hit the regular season on a roll and continued their good form, getting off to a flyer. The Zone Challenge, which was on in October and November, saw two girls playing with the Wildcats Under 12s and two in the Under 14s. Also due to the Eagles needing more players we had one playing Under 12s and 7 girls getting the opportunity to play in the Under 14s. Again this was a great opportunity to further their hockey.

The 2014 season will see about 5 of the girls step up and look towards the Under 16s and allow a few more girls the chance to be a part of the Hockey Geelong Under 14 girls Representative team.

Under 16A Shield

The key objectives we had at the start of the season were:

As a coach:

- Develop and implement a basic set of skills each team member needs to perform including basics, elimination, leading/receiving, fitness and positional play.
- Development of a "house style" game plan for Hockey Geelong in order to convey a consistent message about the style of play desired in Under 16 and Senior teams.
- Outline a defined season plan communicated with the players that splits the year into two distinct periods so the team can reach maximum potential by the end of the season.

As a team:

- To build upon the positive platform set in 2012.
- To be competitive in this competition with the aim to finish mid-table and possibly make a push for the finals.
- To build a culture of inclusiveness in the team that allows each team member a forum to give their views and opinions as well as the confidence to speak up.

As Players:

- To work on developing the basic skills of all team members.
- To develop a player group well-prepared to make the transition into senior teams.
- To instil players with confidence to nominate and participate in higher competition levels, including JSC Zone and State teams.

On a whole I believe we achieved a high level of compliance against all of these objectives. From a coach's point of view we have consistently worked on developing each player's individual skill base and they have shown a marked improvement against these benchmarks through the year.

The style of play we coached had similar core principles to those used in the senior teams. Initially our structure was based on 1:3:2:2:3 method used by Geelong Men's 1^{sts}. However, in the long-run we made an alteration in order to play to our players' strengths. Despite this, the ball movement and player accountability that is key to the Senior men's teams was a consistent theme throughout the year.

As a team I think in many respects we exceeded expectations. This season's competition was incredibly competitive, especially with the reduction in team numbers from 10 to 8 and the transfer of a number of State (and fringe) players from other clubs into already strong teams. As such, to finish 5th on the ladder, 2 points out from the Top 4 was a great achievement.

I also believe the environment we developed within the team and the time we put aside to discuss the way the team played and give every player a forum to have an impact on dissecting previous games and plan for the future games was a positive development. We ran a very structured training program that not only prepared the teams for the weeks' game, but also specifically targeted the players' individual skill development. Having two coaches allowed us to

break the team into smaller groups (normally based on skill level) so we could provide tailored programs.

In addition, the senior team members (notably Ryan and Mack) often assisted in running and coaching these smaller groups which not only benefited the team, but gave them a glimpse into coaching and leadership.

As players there was a high level of success at both State and JSC level (listed later in the report) On top of this we had a number of players represent Geelong at Senior level:

- Emma Hatton Geelong Women's Vic League 1
- Ryan Parry and Mack Dolenc Geelong Men's Vic League 2
- Matt Chaplin and Sean Fitzgerald Geelong Metro

A genuine effort should be made by Hockey Geelong to get a number of these players involved in Senior hockey next season. This should include all those players who are now finished junior hockey as well as a number of bottom-age players with the requisite skills to do so.

Overall this should be considered a highly successful season as team as well as for individual team members. I would like to thank Ruth McKinnon and Chris Little for their excellent work in organising the junior competition this year.

TOURNAMENT DIRECTOR'S REPORT

GENERAL COMMENTS

Hockey Geelong staged a successful Women's Country Week tournament over the Queen's Birthday Long Weekend.

To my Umpire Manager Laura Bennetts, and the Host Association Hockey Geelong, I would like to pass on my sincere thanks, for without their efforts this event would not be staged in such a professional manner. A tireless effort from Laura and one she should be very proud of; I know I am.

To my Assistant Tournament Director Maddie Storr - thanks for the huge effort you put in over the weekend. Maddie worked around 14 hours each day; this made my role a breeze and thanks to this I was able to leave the running of the tournament in her capable hands. This I see as a great chance for developing of both individuals but also the hockey community. With this in mind, Elise Mace from Hockey Victoria and I spoke about placement opportunities for future sports management students and we both agree this is a perfect vehicle for this.

To all the Hockey Geelong volunteers that manned the Canteen and ensured the facility was cleaned during the day, please accept my thanks.

Our First Aid Officer, Mark Frost, for the tireless work and efforts over the weekend - thank you.

This year we had 23 teams compete over the weekend in 5 divisions and we look forward to more teams in the future. I would like to mention the return of Hockey Albury-Wodonga, and Latrobe Valley to the tournament. East Gippsland has increased team numbers and to all associations thanks for your support of this event.

The support from all competitors was great and this allowed me to have a very easy championship and to them I say thank you. To all the teams that travelled many kilometres I acknowledge this as a huge effort and anything I was able to do to accommodate I was more than happy to do.

I would also like to thank the individual team coordinators for their efforts as this allowed me to have a very easy run as Tournament Director. The conduct of all teams was exemplary and the opportunity to have regional development hours put into local umpires from across the state is fantastic.

TOURNAMENT OR PLAYING RECOMMENDATIONS

The event should have at least four divisions with these being A, A Reserve, B and Vets.

The benefit of having the five divisions was shown over the weekend and in future this should be maintained. The increase of teams to participate into the A1 and A2 grades bodes well for country hockey and regional associations such as Warrnambool, East Gippsland, Ballarat and Wimmera.

OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

New trophies are required, as most are fast approaching full status and cannot handle additional division winner's names.

If possible medallions be made available for competition grade winners. This year no medallions were presented and this is something we should look at incorporating into the team entry costs.

HOST ASSOCIATION 2014

The proposed venue for the next year be decided as early as possible, as to allow the host association time to plan and promote the upcoming tournament. Many teams need to be able to book suitable accommodation early to assist in reducing costs for those attending.

I would like to see Hockey Geelong host the event again next year as the second pitch will be operational and they deserve this opportunity. This would also allow the players and associations to make provisions for accommodation and travel arrangements at an earlier and more timesaving manner.

Resources are tight for regional communities and if the early announcement of the host association was made this may allow teams to book closer accommodation and also seek better rates.

Geelong will be able to provide the foundation for this to occur next year and then I feel other associations should be encouraged to see if they can seek to host in the future. Hockey Geelong will and does have great facilities and is the home of Women's Country week for a vast majority of the 88 years of competition.

I would also like to recommend staging a Saturday night event at Stead Park for all visiting teams to attend and have the opportunity to relax, mingle and socialise with other associations.
